

SEASON AFTER THE EPIPHANY

The Feast of the Epiphany is celebrated on 6 January

The liturgical colour for the Feast of the Epiphany is white; the colour of the Season after the Epiphany is green. If the whole of the Incarnation Cycle is observed, the colour will remain white until the Feast of the Presentation on 2 February, after which the colour becomes green. The colour for the Sunday of the Transfiguration, the last Sunday after the Epiphany, is white.

The focus of the readings reveals the trust that Christ is manifested to humankind, to the world, to the entire creation. In them we catch a glimpse of the cosmic dimension of the work and achievement of Christ. They also express the challenge for all Christians to reveal that truth through their own lives.

New beginnings, new births

Psalm 139; Genesis 15; Luke 1:57-80

You, my child, will be called a prophet of the Most High God; you will go ahead of the Lord to prepare his road for him, to tell his people that they will be saved, by having their sins forgiven.

Luke 1:76-77

A new year is a time for new beginnings and of new births. The above prophecy over his baby by John the Baptist's father is echoed in the lives of many of the Celtic saints. Such Prophecies were signs that God was doing something new from the very beginning of their lives.

Take, for example, the parents of St Samson, Anna and Amon. They were court officials in neighbouring kingdoms of fifth-century Wales. Anna was infertile. She took to fasting, to charitable giving, and to churchgoing in order to get God to give her a child. One day when they were in church they overheard an animated discussion about a man in North Wales who could foretell with uncanny accuracy what would happen to people.

So Amon and Anna undertook a three-day journey to see this man, Librarius, who gave them overnight accommodation. Next day Librarius surprised Amon twice. First, he told them, before they had spoken of it, he knew they had come because Anna was barren and they wanted him to prophesy that they would have a baby. Second, he asked Amon, not just to give him payment, but to have made a silver rod the same length as his wife and to give this to God, A rod is a symbol of a ruler's control. It seemed God wanted both Amon and Anna to put God first, before power, before one another, and even before their longed-for baby. Amon was so keen to respond that he made not one, but three rods, and handed them all over.

That night an angel told Anna in her dreams that she would indeed have a baby who would be holy, profitable to many, seven times brighter than the silver her husband had given to God, and that 'of the British race there has not been or will be anyone like him'. The angel encouraged Anna to trust God and to name the baby Samson, after the biblical Samson, who was so strong for God. Few who read the *Life of St Samson* can doubt that all that was prophesied has indeed come to pass.

Holy Innocents

Holy Innocents (1st century AD)

The children of Bethlehem who were massacred on the orders of Herod in his attempts to eliminate the threat posed by the newborn Christ (as related at Matthew 2:1-18). Their number is given in different sources as being anything from 6 to 25. They were identified as martyrs as early as the 4th century and their memory was once celebrated in the English feast of Childermas. They are considered the protectors of dead children and comforters of their grieving parents.
