Ain't no party like an Eastertide party... 💐

That's right; Easter Sunday is only the beginning!

A great fifty-day feast (known as "Eastertide," "Easter Season," or "Easter Time," as well as "Paschal Tide," "Paschal Season," or "Paschal Time") kicks off on Easter Day. In the Church Year, this is quite literally fifty days of feasting. Easter is the high point of the Church Year. So it makes sense that we would party for so long. After all, the main point of the whole gospel is to prepare us for an eternal celebration and feast.

This is reflected in the fact that our Lenten fast only lasts forty days (not including Sundays), while Easter is fifty days. Fasting will pass away, as Jesus said, but the Great Feast of the Lamb will last for ages of ages (a Hebrew into Greek idiom for eternity!).

So, let the feasting begin!

Why fifty days of Easter Time?

40 + 10 = 50. After the resurrection, Jesus spent forty days on earth before he ascended, and then there were ten more days after that before the Day of Pentecost.

Luke writes in the first chapter of Acts that Jesus "presented himself alive to them after his suffering by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God."

In Luke 2, we find the followers of Jesus gathered for the Day of Pentecost, which actually means "fifty." It happened during the Hebrew feast of Shavuot, which is why the followers of Jesus were gathering. The Hebrew festival was originally a harvest first fruits celebration, and later it had evolved into a commemoration of the giving of the Law to Moses on Mt. Sinai.

So, Eastertide is a celebration of the Resurrection of Christ and all that means for us, leading to the launching of the Christian Church and its mission on Pentecost.

How do Christians celebrate the Easter season? After giving up the word for Lent, we say "Alleluia!" a lot during Eastertide! Here's the traditional Eastertide greeting and response: Person 1: "Alleluia! Christ is risen!" Person/people 2: "The Lord is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

Ok, now that that's out of the way, let's take a moment to note that the Easter season actually begins with the Easter Vigil, traditionally held sometime after dark on Holy Saturday evening. Easter Day Celebrations then take place on Easter Sunday.

The Lectionary readings (Sunday Scriptures) during the following Sundays of Easter explore the post-resurrection appearances of Christ, and also the promise of a future resurrection.

We go back to a closed room in which Jesus suddenly appears...but Thomas isn't there. He doubts. Jesus later appears to him. Poor Thomas, forever cast as "doubting" even though his doubts were a helpful thing that eventually led him to worship Jesus and say, "My Lord, and My God."

Then we have breakfast with Jesus and Peter. Peter had denied Jesus three times and, after the Resurrection, had returned to fishing. Jesus restores him and gives him a mission: "Feed my Sheep" and "Follow me." (He also prophecies that Peter will be arrested and martyred. Tough breakfast conversation.)

We revisit Jesus' teaching on himself and his mission as well. He is preparing his disciples, and us, to take the power of his Resurrection to the world. Ascension Day then falls on the 40th day of Eastertide, which always falls on a Thursday. Because this is a weekday, some churches observe or focus on the Ascension that following Sunday, the Seventh Sunday of Easter. At Ascension, we hear Jesus give us the Great Commission, our true Mission Statement.

Eastertide then brings us to the feast of Pentecost (AKA "Whitsunday") on the 50th day. (Or, you know, since these details are always debated and contested, some maintain that Eastertide lasts until the Saturday before Trinity Sunday, which is the first Sunday after Pentecost.) After that, it's "Ordinary Time" (AKA "The Season after Pentecost")!

ST PHILIP AND ST JAMES, APOSTLES

St Philip (1st century) Apostle. Acording to the New Testament, Philip lived in Bethsaida in Galile before being recruited as a disciple and himself persuading Nathanael (St Bartholomew) to join the group. He was present at several of the most important episodes of Christ's ministry, inclduing the Feeding of the Five Thousand and the Last Supper. After the Crucifixion he is said to have preached the gospel in Phrygia and ultimately to have died at Hierapolis, possibly being martyred for his faith during the reign of Domitian. Today his is honoured as a patron saint of Uruguay. His emblem is loaves of bread *Feast Day 3 May*



St James the Less (d.c.61) Apostle. James the Less (so called to distinguish him from another apostle, James the Greater) was the son of a man named Alphaeus and is traditionally identified either as a brother or first cousin of Christ. If the identification as Jesus' brother is correct, he is the one to whom the risen Christ appeared and subsequently he became the first bishop of Jerusalem, in which post he presided over a meeting of the apostles to decide whether Gentile converts had to become Jews. He supported the eventual conclusion that Gentiles and Jews could worship God alongside one another within the church. James is traditionally identified as the author of the Epistle of St James in the New Testament. As well as being the patron saint of Uruguay, he is honoured as the patron saint of apothecaries, fullers, hatters, milliners, pharmacists and the dying. His emblem is a fuller's club.

Feast Day 3 May

ST JOHN, APOSTLE

St John (d.c.100) Apostle. Variously called John the Apostle, John the Evangelist or John the Divine, he was one of the most trusted of Christ's disciples as well as the youngest, and the only one of them to witness the Crucifixion. A fishserman of Galilee alongside his brother St James and his father Zebedee, he ws rarely separated from Christ after his recruitment as a disciple. Other key biblical moments at which John was present included the last Supper, at which he was permitted to recline against Christ, and the discovery of Christ's empty tomb. At the Crucifixion it was to John that christ entrusted the future care of his mother Mary. Following the deaths of St Peter and St Paul, John stayed with the church at Ephesus. According to one tradition he was taken from there to Rome on the orders of the Emperor Domitian, but miraculously escaped execution and was subsequently exiled to the island of Patmos, were he wrote the Book of Revelation, before returning to Ephesus in 96. It may have been at Ephesus that he wrote the Gospel that carries his name and finally died at a very advanced age, becoming the only disciple to die a natural death. When he became too old and feeble to preach he simply exhorted the faithful to love one another. He is the patron saint of theologians and writers. His emblem is an eagle.
